What to Do Before and After the Mystic Rally

Late September and October is a wonderful time to be in New England. The fall colors are in full bloom. All through New England the trees are decorated in brilliant shades of red, gold, and orange. Take some time before or after the Mystic rally to explore this beautiful and fascinating region of our country.

In the rally information that Rally Coordinator Phyllis Johnson sent to everyone there was an invitation from CHOC members Ed and Ann Shea. The Sheas have invited all rally attendees to camp at their RV park, Greenwood Lodge and Campsites, in Woodford, VT at a discounted rate. Within a few miles of Woodford, there are many fun and interesting attractions. If you're a fan of the catalog, don't miss the Vermont Country Store in Weston, VT. Other fun Vermont attractions include the Ben and Jerry's ice cream factory tour and the Shelburne Museum.

The White Mountains of New Hampshire are gorgeous in the fall. You can drive up Mt . Washington in your tow car (Don't take your Platinum up there!) or you can take a ride to the top on the historic Cog Railroad. The shopping in nearby North Conway is legendary...and there's no sales tax!

Are you interested in the history of the American Revolution? Boston is a great place to visit...just don't take your coach into the city! There's a really nice campground about 30 miles outside of the city called Boston Minute Man Campground in Littleton, MA. If you tow a car, you can drive a short distance to the Boston subway station and take the train into the city. From there you can use one of the trolley services to get around to all the sights. And if you don't tow, there are Boston tour companies that will pick you up right at the campground.

Boston Minute Man is just down the road from the battlefields of Lexington and Concord, site of the "shot heard round the world" where the revolutionary war began. And there's plenty more history in Boston itself. From the Bunker Hill site and museum, to the North Church of "one if by land, two if by sea" fame, to Paul Revere's home, there's plenty to see and do. The homes of President John Adams and his son, President John Quincy Adams have been beautifully preserved and restored in the town of Quincy, MA, a suburb of Boston. And don't miss the wonderful John F. Kennedy presidential library. Rick and I have visited quite a few of the presidential libraries, but we found this one to be the most interesting and moving of all of them.

And if you want to continue a few more miles up the road, Maine is beautiful this time of year and most of the crowds are gone. Consider a visit to the coast of Maine where you can eat lobster every night, visit the beautiful Acadia National Park, go whale watching, and shop at the flagship LL Bean store. If you'll be bringing the "fur kids," we found Acadia to be the most "dog-friendly" of all the national parks that we have visited. And the nearby town of Bar Harbor welcomes dogs almost everywhere, including the patios of many restaurants. Try Narrows II, an Encore resort, in Trenton, ME, just outside of Bar Harbor. If you're Passport America members, you can stay for half price on weekdays.
